

In 2018, some 25 years after neighbouring rights were officially introduced in the Netherlands, we have passed the magical number of €1 billion in collected fees for our right-holders. Record companies, main artists, session musicians, conductors, bands, choirs and orchestras have all received what was due to them for having their music played in public. This is something we are proud of. Since being founded, we have paid out remuneration to over 62,000 right-holders. In keeping with our mission, we have been doing so as quickly and as accurately as possible for the lowest possible fee.

Since technological developments in our field take place extremely rapidly, our approach to dealing with these is a proactive one. MySena (our online portal), our app and the related IT infrastructure are continuously being optimized to provide available distribution information to our right-holders in as user-friendly a manner as possible. The introduction of fingerprinting technology has enabled us to take a new major step in further enhancing our distribution. We are also active participants in various international working groups and projects, including the establishment of the Virtual Repertoire Database (VRDB), primarily intended for the performers organizations within SCAPR, and the MLC Dataportal for producer organizations.

DISTRIBUTION OF FEES TO RIGHT-HOLDERS

In 2018, we distributed a gross total of €67.9 million to the over 30,000 right-holders. On the one hand, this increase of 15.4% in our distribution was the result of a decrease in the work in progress position, which led to an increase in the distribution percentage of music years 2015 and 2016 in particular. On the other hand, we were able to implement a further acceleration of our distribution process, which meant that we were to able pay out licence fee income from the same year as early as March 2018. Another positive contribution came from the ability to use fingerprinting data and the possibility to consult the Virtual Repertoire Database (VRDB). Furthermore, in 2018, more money was distributed that had been collected in the same year than in 2017. The gross Dutch distribution of collected fees totalled €57.7 million (+11.7%).

The gross international distribution of collected fees totalled €10.2 million (+40.3%) in 2018. During 2018, we were able to distribute fees collected from earlier years. In part, this was enabled by specific action taken in relation to our sister organizations.
